Teaching Excellence Framework

On the 22nd of June 2017 the University of Law (ULaw) was awarded a gold ranking in the UK Government led Teaching Excellence Framework (TEF).

The teaching excellence framework (TEF) is a system that assesses the quality of teaching in universities in England. It also includes some universities from Scotland and Wales.

The framework has been introduced by the UK Government to provide a resource for students to judge teaching quality in universities and to increase the importance of teaching excellence

295 HE and FE institutions were assessed. Only 43 Universities (out of 134) were awarded Gold.

Only 7 Russell Group Universities were awarded Gold.

Other issues

Visa for short courses

- Participants who are European Economic Area or Swiss nationals do not require a visa to study in the UK.
- Students from other countries need to be assessed on whether they will need to apply for a visa. Please consult the Ulaw site for further updates at https://www.law.ac.uk/international/ visa-requirements/

Medical insurance

- If participants are an EEA student or Swiss national, they should obtain a European Health Insurance Card.
- If participants are not from a country with a reciprocal agreement, they are not entitled to free
 health care under the National Health Service. As private Health care in the UK can be very
 expensive, it is proposed that the students should take out a comprehensive medical
 insurance (including cover for hospitalisation and repatriation) before they leave their home
 country.



How to apply

- Students have to be at undergraduate level or above.
- Students do not have to undertake a specific English test (IELTS)
 to gain entry onto the programme. However they will be expected
 to be at a level of English equivalent to an IELTS score of 5.5
